Losing my sight hit me very badly, mentally, and I became quite depressed. I withdrew from everyone I knew. All I focused on was what I was losing. I could no longer read books, hop on my motorbike, visit my synagogue – all the things that brought me joy. My religion is very important to me, but I felt like a fraud going to synagogue because I could no longer read my prayer book. I was miserable.

But the first time I put a harness on and walked Scooby I instantly knew there was a connection there, it felt right.

The thing with walking with a long cane is that you have to hit the obstacle to know it's there. We did the same route that I'd done a hundred times before, but all of a sudden I didn't have to hit anything. He walked around the lamppost, he walked around the A-boards, he took me straight to the drop kerb, he took me straight home.

As I stepped into my house, the first thing my wife did was give me a big hug and say 'You've found your smile again!'

So thank you so much for fundraising for Guide Dogs. Big or small, the money you raise means more people could have life-changing dogs like Scooby. Scooby hasn't only given me the ability to get from A to B, the greatest gift he's given me is that removal of social isolation. He put that smile back on my face, which was my first step in that journey of coming back to Me. And that's all from Scooby and Guide Dogs.

Guide dog cookies

Use your Labrador cookie cutter included in your fundraising pack to bake up your own litter of guide dogs. The perfect addition to your bake sale or decorating competition.

Ingredients

- 100g unsalted butter, softened at room temperature
- 100g caster sugar
- 1 medium egg, lightly beaten
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 275g plain flour

Decoration

- 2 tbsp cocoa powder if you want chocolate Labradors
- Ready-made fondant icing check out our handy guide to what colours to buy

What will your guide dogs wear?

White and yellow harness = working guide dog

Brown harness = trainee guide dog

Blue coat = puppy in training or buddy dog

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 190C/170C Fan/ Gas 5. Line a baking tray with greaseproof paper.
- Cream the butter and sugar together in a bowl until combined. Beat in the egg and vanilla extract, a little at a time, until well combined, then stir in the flour and bring together to form a dough.
- Want some of your litter to be chocolate? Split your dough in half, set one half aside, and add cocoa to the other until thoroughly combined.
- 4. Wrap the dough in cling film and chill in the fridge for 30 minutes.
- 5. Roll the dough out on a lightly floured work surface to a thickness of 1cm.
 Cut biscuits out of the dough using the guide dog shaped cookie cutter included in your pack and carefully place onto the baking tray.

6. Bake for 8-10 minutes, or until pale golden-brown. Set aside to harden for 2 minutes, then cool on a wire rack.

Decoration

If you want to decorate your litter of guide dogs, we recommend using ready-made fondant icing.

- 7. Roll out to approx. ½ cm thickness and cut out shapes to create your guide dog harness or coat. The easiest way to stick your icing to your biscuits is to mix a little icing sugar with water.
- 8. Feeling creative? Make your own icing too! Royal Icing, buttercream and glace icing will all work.



More fundraising tips

Puppy sweepstake

Boost your fundraising by up to £60 at your bake sale till by asking your customers to donate an extra £2 to guess the puppy's

name on your sweepstake.
Donate a prize like your
showstopping centrepiece
cake or ask a local
business for a gift voucher.



Go cashless with a QR code

Get a unique QR barcode you can print and display by your money box when you create a JustGiving fundraising page. Your customers can then scan to access your fundraising page instantly using the camera on their phone, giving them a quick an easy way to donate. Simply add /qrcode at the end of your fundraising page URL to get yours. For example, justgiving.com/fundraising/MrsFundraiser/grcode.

Pricing your bakes

Use our suggested donation labels to make sure your bakes are clearly labelled. Settle on three or four price points such as 50p a biscuit, £1 a cupcake, £2 for a homemade sausage roll, or even £5 for a box of six cakes to take away. You could even offer a drink as a combo for an extra £1.

Invite a free speaker

Hosting a bake sale at work? Invite a free Guide Dog speaker to tell their story at a face-to-face or online team meeting before your fundraiser takes place. This could help colleagues understand the impact of their donations and make them more likely to support your fundraising effort. You could even get to meet one of our life-changing dogs. How your baking helps

Samuel's story

Six-year-old Samuel was diagnosed with oculocutaneous albinism when he was three years old. Samuel and his parents Ed and Karen went on a Guide Dogs Family Day event, where they first met our Habilitation Specialist, Sharon. Sharon helped Samuel learn how to use a long cane when outside, how to cross roads safely and told the family about our buddy dog scheme.



Rosie's a very easy dog to have around. She helps give Samuel some confidence when he's out and about. She comes along to drop Samuel off at events, such as holiday clubs, and she attends his piano lessons, has been to Beavers with him - and she even attends hospital appointments. She seems to understand that it's Samuel who is vision impaired in the house, and she looks out for him.

Rosie hasn't only been good for Samuel, but also for us as a family, including his brother and sister. Taking Rosie for walks is something we all do together, as everyone wants to come along.

We've also given Samuel an iPad through our Tech for All programme which has helped him with his reading.

As well as the fun side for him, being able to interact with CBeebies apps, it meant we could download a lot of school apps at home and read a lot of the books. And it means now his reading is progressing we can take pictures of the books and expand them, so that he can read and engage with them at home as well. It means that his friends can bring a book and he can read it too.



Guide dog cookies

Guide dog pupcakes

These adorable vanilla guide dog pupcakes are sure to go down a treat and help you to raise lots of life-changing dough.

Ingredients

- 110g butter, softened
- · 225g caster sugar
- 2 large eggs
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 150g self-raising flour, sifted
- 125g plain flour, sifted
- 120ml semi skimmed milk, at room temperature

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 180C/160C Fan/Gas 4. Line a 12-hole muffin tray with appropriate size cupcake cases.
- 2. In a large mixing bowl, cream the butter and sugar together until the mixture is pale, light and fluffy.
- 3. Combine the two flours in a separate bowl. Put the milk in a jug and add the vanilla extract to it.
- 4. Add 1/3 flour to the creamed mixture and beat well. Pour in 1/3 of the milk and beat again. Repeat these steps until all the flour and milk have been added.
- 5. Spoon mixture into the cupcake cases, filling them 2/3 full. Bake in the oven for 25 minutes.
- 6. Remove from the oven and leave to cool. You can then begin icing.



Decoration

- 7. Roll out icing to approx. ½ cm thickness. Cut a large circle to create your pup's face, medium to create the nose, and small semi-circles folded at the edge to create the ears. Don't forget to also add your pup's eyes, nose and tongue. The easiest way to stick your icing to your cakes is to mix a little icing sugar with water.
- 8. Not good at decorating? Try ready-made buttercream and use one of your edible Guide Dogs cake toppers from within your fundraising pack to decorate instead.

Dog-friendly biscuits

These quick and easy cheesy treats will be a guaranteed hit with pups of all sizes!

Ingredients

- 115ml of hot water
- 1 chicken or beef stock cube
- 1 egg
- 200g wholemeal flour
- 40g grated cheddar cheese

Only recommended as a treat.

Treats should be counted as part of your dog's daily diet. Not suitable for puppies.

Method

- Preheat the oven to 180°C/160°C Fan/Gas 4.
 Grease or line 2 baking sheets.
- 2. Add 115ml of boiling water to stock cube to dissolve.
- 3. Mix flour, egg, and stock together before adding the cheese.
- 4. Mix thoroughly, adding more flour or water until it comes together as a dough.
- 5. Sprinkle your surface with flour, and gently knead your dough, before rolling out to a thickness of about ½ cm.
- Cut into shapes, dipping the cutter into flour as you go, and place the biscuits on the baking sheets. We recommend using a bone shape, but any cutter shape works.

- 7. Knead together any dough scraps and roll them back out again to create even more cheesy dog biscuits. You'll be surprised how many you can get out of this small batch.
- 8. Bake for 15-20 minutes until golden and crisp, before cooling on a rack
- 9. No need to decorate these they are perfectly delicious as they are!
