Recently we've had our first visit to a shopping centre and Betty was a terrific shopping partner. I was pleased by how well she did, especially the way she navigated through busy crowds. She was calm but confident. The shopping centre is a great place for Betty because she can go in a lift, which she loves! Lifts can be challenging for some new pups, but Betty took to them so well.

New skills

I've recently introduced her to a TTouch harness, which allows for multiple points of contact with her body. This will help Betty become familiar with this feeling

Training - puppy to qualified guide dog

It takes around 20 months of training to transform a pup into a qualified guide dog. The pups learn basic skills and are introduced to new surroundings with their Puppy Raiser. They then venture on to Guide Dogs Training School, where they learn the foundation tasks required of a guide dog. The final stages of training focus on their partnership with a new owner, where they learn specific skills tailored to their owner's specific needs.



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
