I'm excited to update you on what I've been up to since your last Pupdate. Betty is still Betty, such a happy dog! She's so lovely and really enjoys playing. Her favourite toy is still her rope toy as we always play with it together, so she associates it with having fun. She's such a mature young dog. People can't believe she's only a year old when we're out and about. Betty goes for a free run every day with my pet dog Zoe and loves it; everything is fun to her. She still has that 'puppy way' about her, but as soon as her lead is on, she knows it's time for business and is completely focused on what we're doing.

Developing skills

Since your last Pupdate, I've been working on consolidating all the skills Betty has learnt with me and perfecting them before she goes off to training school. Betty loves a cuddle and some treats, and she knows if she does what's asked, she'll get something tasty – she's so eager to please! Her recall is amazing, but I'm still working on her settling completely when we are out in public places. For example, in a café she will sit there and relax but lying down and switching off is more challenging for her.

We've been working with the TTouch harness with Betty, and for now, I only use it when going out for free runs so that she builds a positive association with it. I hope this will carry through to her training harness when the time comes.

New experiences

Betty continues to have lots of new experiences. She has been on many different modes of transport. She travels by car often, but she also goes on trains and buses. Ensuring Betty is comfortable on public transport is important for her potential future role, as people with visual impairments often rely on public transport to get around.

Recently Betty has been to the cinema with my grandchildren and me. She was amazing, they got bored before she did. I also went to see a musical at the theatre with Betty and it had lots of singing and dancing in it, but she wasn't bothered at all.

As well as this, she has accompanied me on more trips in my campervan and loves them, she always has the best time. Betty has even had her first stay in a hotel, which is exciting! I wasn't sure how she would be, but she was great and totally relaxed.




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The future
