Bonnie has really grown up over these last few months. She's still the same joyful dog but she has become more settled in herself. Since your last Pupdate, our lovely Bonnie unfortunately had an accidental injury to her tail and it had to be operated on to remove some of its length to help it heal. I'm pleased to say that Bonnie has recovered well from her operation and is learning to adapt to life with a shorter (but still very waggy) tail. This accident shouldn't stop Bonnie from progressing, and I hope that she'll be partnered with someone who will celebrate her uniqueness!

Bonnie's maturing

Bonnie is growing out of her teenage phase and is now much more responsive to cues. She loves to be rewarded with praise, but a tasty snack still goes down a treat. Bonnie's such an amazing dog and takes everything in her stride. She became very popular with the veterinary nurses when going in for check-ups on her tail, and she loved all the extra fuss she got. She's been fantastic!

Developing skills

Bonnie's training has come on in leaps and bounds since your last Pupdate. We recently slowed down her training to focus on her recovery, but she's still making great progress. I've introduced a new skill called 'let's go'. I practise this with her when there are distractions. such as dogs and people, and it signals to her that we're moving in a different direction. Bonnie's picked this up really quickly and I'm so proud of her. I've also been teaching Bonnie the cue 'go sniff'. This allows her to sniff periodically during a walk after hearing this cue, meaning when she's working, she won't be distracted by new smells. I'll give her the cue in a small, safe area so that she can explore the new scents. Sniffing is also fantastic mental stimulation for Bonnie, helping to keep her happy and her mind active. I've also been focusing on Bonnie's food manners, and she's made some good progress. Bonnie's really developing her self-control and I'm proud of how far she's come. I'll continue to work on this with her over the coming months.
