Developing skills

I've tried to make sure that Coco is gradually introduced to new things when we want to train her on a particular skill to help increase her confidence with it. For example, Coco was initially a bit wary of stairs. To help her with this I started out with practising at home and would sit on the middle of my stairs. Eventually Coco would come and sit by my side, and then slowly took her time in coming up the stairs. Now she is excellent with stairs!

Coco has progressed well in her training, and despite restrictions I've been able to take her to different areas to train. Prior to lockdown I took her in a lift to get out of a car park – she was brilliant and didn't seem to notice anything was out of the ordinary. Before lockdown we were also able to meet up with other puppy raisers and their pups in training. This helped Coco with her dog distraction.

Coco is a very bouncy and energetic pup who is lovely to be around. She always has a spring in her step, which is handy for jumping in the back of the car! However, it also means that Coco wants to jump on the sofa. To move past this every time I see Coco lying nicely on the floor I'll give her a treat. I have no doubt that in the future Coco will learn not to jump on the sofa.

Training - Puppy to qualified guide dog

It takes around 20 months of training to transform a newborn pup into a qualified guide dog. The pups learn basic commands and are introduced to new surroundings with their Puppy Raiser. They then venture on to Guide Dogs training school, where they learn the foundation tasks required of a guide dog. The final stages of training focus on their partnership with a new owner, where they learn specific skills tailored to their owner's specific needs.

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
