
your sponsored pup. None of this would be

# My sight loss

I have an eye condition called retinitis pigmentosa. I'm completely blind in my left eye and have 10% vision in my right eye. At the moment, it's like looking through a straw but I'm noticing that it's getting smaller over time. As I have a small amount of vision. I can tell the difference between night and day, but at night I can't see at all. This is an inherited eye condition that I've always lived with; it was passed down from my mother, who is also supported by Guide Dogs and has her own guide dog called Alfie. When I was 12, my mum got her first guide dog. The confidence and independence he gave her was incredible. Comet is my third guide dog, so I know the charity and their wonderful work very well.

When my last guide dog Kim retired, I started using a white cane again. One of the biggest differences I noticed is that people don't help you as much when you have a white cane as opposed to a guide dog. With a guide dog, people are much more aware of you. I struggled not having a guide dog for a few years, especially during the pandemic. When I got the news that I had a match, I was so excited and couldn't wait to meet Comet!

### **Welcoming Comet**

I stayed in a hotel near the training centre when I first met Comet. Guide Dog Mobility Specialist Sian knocked on my hotel room door and brought Comet inside – it was the best room service I've ever ordered! He settled quickly with me and when he got up the next morning, it was like we had always been together.

Comet's a very chilled and happy dog but also very nosey and likes to be involved in everything, which works well as I love his constant company. We're very similar in a lot of ways. Comet loves to cuddle, and I may be biased but he gives the best hugs. Comet's very funny and we both have a great sense of humour; he's brought so much positivity to my life.

# Life together so far

Life's a lot easier with Comet, he's given me back my self-assurance and independence. Nothing seems to faze him, and he's confident in his abilities to look after me, which is lovely. We've only been together a short time but have already settled into a routine.
