Unfortunately, Derek has had some health issues affecting his legs, which have slowed down his progress slightly. He's been on restricted exercise so getting out has been a challenge. Despite this, he's making steady progress and is now returning to a normal exercise routine so I'm excited to see what the next few months will hold!

Derek is a joy to train and have at home. His enthusiasm for learning knows no bounds and he's been picking up new skills quickly. He loves his food, which definitely makes training easier! He's growing fast and I think he's going to be a very big dog – he's certainly no longer the small fluffball that he used to be, and people are often surprised when I tell them he is still a puppy.

Training - puppy to qualified guide dog

It takes around 20 months of training to transform a pup into a qualified guide dog. The pups learn basic skills and are introduced to new surroundings with their Puppy Raiser. They then venture on to Guide Dogs Training School, where they learn the foundation tasks required of a guide dog. The final stages of training focus on their partnership with a new owner, where they learn specific skills tailored to their owner's specific needs.
