### Derek's health

In your last Pupdate, I mentioned the health issues that Derek was experiencing with his legs. Derek has a condition that is easiest to describe as 'growing pains'. His health condition seemed to have resolved itself earlier in the year but unfortunately it has now returned. I am working closely with Derek's Puppy Development Adviser to help him on the road to recovery. As we have done before, we are restricting his exercise. It's important we do this because it helps to move his lea muscles very slowly and cause him as little discomfort as possible. It's a bit like learning to run long distances: start with small amounts of running and slowly build it up.

Due to his restricted exercise, Derek has been showing more signs of separation anxiety. Since your last Pupdate we hadn't been able to make a lot of progress with this before his health condition returned, but I had seen some small improvements.

I am working hard with his Puppy Development Adviser to slowly increase how long I'm away from him for while making it a positive experience for him. Derek is an extremely smart puppy, and he likes to be kept busy, so giving him a frozen bone while he is on his own helps to keep him occupied. Tasty treats like this help Derek to learn that being on his own for short periods of time is a nice experience. He is slowly improving and I'm hoping that these improvements continue to grow.

### Derek's training

Before Derek's health condition returned, he was making great progress with his training!
Previously he would rush on and off the bus but now he is very polite and takes great care. Derek is very tall – and all legs – so he doesn't fit too well in between the seats on buses or trains. Sometimes, if there's space, we sit in accessible seating, where there is lots more room for him. Nothing fazes him when travelling! He is so content that sometimes he doesn't realise which mode of transport he is on.

He loves going to do the weekly food shop with me, especially when we go down the dog food aisle. It's not my favourite task but seeing how much Derek loves it helps me to look forward to it each week. ## **Future plans**

I am hopeful that Derek's health recovers so I can continue to prepare him for training school. For the moment I am focusing on reducing his separation anxiety and doing my best to help him to a speedy recovery from his health condition.
