Welcoming Dexter

When Dexter first arrived, he didn't like to be left alone and would follow me around the house. But his confidence grew quickly, and he's now settled well. He's got a lovely comfortable bed but often prefers to lie on the cool floor tiles, especially when the weather is warm.

All the puppies I've raised have had their own unique personalities, and Dexter is no exception. He's such a happy dog; his whole body shakes when he wags his tail! He absolutely loves attention and will run up to anyone for some fuss. He will say hello to other dogs when out but he's a little uncertain of dogs with coats on he's not sure what to make of them! One of Dexter's little guirks is that he loves the camera - as soon as the camera comes out, he strikes a pose!

Home life

We have a pet dog, Dawson, who used to be a guide dog in training, and he is like a big brother to Dexter. They get on so well together and love playing with each other. Dexter has a favourite green crocodile toy and loves to play tug with Dawson; he'll pick it up and take it to Dawson to try and entice him into a game. While Dawson's a wonderful and patient brother, when he's not up for a game, Dexter is great at entertaining himself. He loves to strut around with his toys in his mouth looking very proud of himself!




Dexter is a very intelligent boy. He's made great progress on learning some of his basic skills such as 'sit' and 'down'. He's very eager to please and his tail is always wagging when we're training! He's mastered toileting on cue; he's got a penned off area in the garden that he uses for toileting, and he knows not to go anywhere else.


