In 2022, we supported over 4,060 guide dog partnerships and nearly 700 My Sighted Guide partnerships, a service which connects a locally trained volunteer with a person with sight loss. We couldn't provide these services without supporters like you – thank you.

66 Hello, it's Caroline here, Douglas' Puppy Raiser.

I've been puppy raising for Guide Dogs for six years now. I was recovering from a long-term illness and wanted to do something where I could give back. My doctor suggested becoming a puppy raiser, and I haven't looked back since! I'm also a mentor for new puppy raisers, helping them along on their puppy raising journeys. I adore socialising with the pups, it's when I'm at my happiest. I enjoy helping a young life changer start their journey. It's very rewarding to feel like you're helping to change someone's life for the better.

Settling in

Douglas was a bit unsettled for the first few days. I gave him lots of cuddles and made sure he had lots of soft toys to snuggle up with, this worked a treat. I have a pet Labrador called Harry. He's like a big brother to Douglas and helped him to settle into home life. Harry is very gentle with Douglas; they have a great bond. They enjoy free runs and will curl up for a nap together once we get home. It's very sweet!

Douglas has also made a new best friend, 8-year-old yellow Labrador, Winston. His face lights up, and his tail starts wagging really fast as soon as he sees him at the park.

Douglas' personality

Douglas and I have a great bond. I'm really enjoying getting to know him and watching his little personality develop and blossom. He's such a cute pup, and everyone that meets him loves him instantly!

He's the most mischievous pup I've raised, but he's also very laid back and takes everything in his stride. Douglas is different to the last puppy I raised, fellow sponsored puppy, Bonnie. He's calmer and likes to observe. However, when he's on a free run he has so much energy and bounces around, it's funny to watch!


Scan me

After 12-16 months, our dogs move on to training school, where they learn guiding skills. Evenings and weekends are usually spent with our fantastic fosterers who care for the dog, reinforce training, and drop them off to training school each day!
