Both Meri and Tiana were puppies raised by Bob and June and have a lovely connection with Finn. Although Bob and June were not able to take Finn onto public transport due to lockdown restrictions, they came up with a very intelligent solution. They would take Finn to visit a train station during quiet times and would practise walking on and off a stationary train. 


Introduction to training school
