While there, we also visited the coast and Frank had his first experience on a beach! He loved it. Some pups can be a bit nervous about the sea, but he wasn't fazed at all. He takes to new places like a duck to water!

Frank absolutely loves meeting new people. We've been to a few fundraising events together, as well as to schools and Brownie groups to talk to the children. When Frank has his puppy coat on, he knows he's in work mode and greets everyone calmly. He was fantastic with the children and said hello gently when they came up to fuss him at the end.

However, when he's not in his puppy coat, Frank can be a little overenthusiastic when greeting people and occasionally jumps up. He's such a friendly pup and just gets a little overexcited. I'm trying to teach him that he can be just as friendly with four paws on the ground and he's making fantastic progress.

Frank's recall is also wonderful. He's getting more adventurous now and starting to venture further away than he used to, but if he goes around a corner, then I'll just call him back, and he comes immediately. He's such a good dog!

#### What is Puppy Raising for Guide Dogs?

Puppy Raising for Guide Dogs is our bespoke puppy-raising programme that guide dog pups follow while living with their puppy raisers. It was designed in consultation with volunteers, staff, training behaviour consultants and canine research staff. It's based on Positive Reinforcement Training (PRT) which focuses on rewarding good behaviour and creating positive associations with new experiences. We treat each pup as an individual and help to support their physical, behavioural, and emotional development.
