Skills and experiences

Grace loves children. Since her last Pupdate, I've been working on improving her distraction while meeting them. I work in a school, and it's the ideal environment for her to meet lots of kids of all ages. She behaves very well. It's great to teach children when they can approach qualified guide dogs or dogs in training, always asking for permission from the owner first. I took her to sports day to help improve her distraction; she was amazing and settled so well.

My wife Mandy and I have visited many different places with Grace: we've been to restaurants, cafés and a large shopping centre. We've been practising walking up and down the stairs and stopping at the top and bottom. I also travelled by train with Grace and she wasn't fazed at all.

Grace and I meet other puppy raisers and their pups regularly, and it's great for her to socialise. She also had the chance to sleep over at my daughter's house. I thought she'd miss me, but on the contrary, all was well; surprisingly, she also got along well with the cat!

Labradors and golden retrievers are the most common pure breeds in our training programme, and historically crossing these two breeds has produced the most successful guide dogs. But did you know that we also breed and train German shepherds, poodles and curly coated retrievers? These dogs often become successful guides and also provide secondary benefits, such as longer strides for faster walkers, or shedding less hair which is very important for guide dog owners with allergies to dog hair!
