I'm very much a dog person; I've had many pet dogs in the past, and Hazel is my second guide dog puppy. I'm semiretired, and having a puppy around gives me some extra company. Puppy raising adds so much to my life. It gives me a purpose and allows me to meet very nice people.

#### **Settling in**

Hazel's growing up fast; she's very tall and leggy! She's the first girl pup I've had. She's very sweet-natured; her personality is so calm compared to my previous pups at her age.

Hazel settled in at home quickly: I slept on the sofa close to her bed for the first two nights. Now she's settled, she sleeps very comfortably. Hazel adapted to the new routine straight away. She wakes up eager to play with her favourite toys – Pinkity Pink, a cuddly pink dragon, and Wonky Donk, a soft grey donkey. Then, it's breakfast time! We enjoy a training walk around lunchtime, followed by some downtime in the afternoon. I usually work from home, but if I need to go to the office, she comes with me – she's such a good girl!

#### Hazel's first experiences

Hazel's a little lady with manners that make everyone smile - people often think she's older than she really is! She's been busy learning all sorts of interesting things in puppy classes. Hazel's mastering new cues like 'sit' and 'down'; she's learning to focus on what she's asked, even when there are distractions like loud noises in busy places or dogs playing nearby. Hazel's starting to master the art of maintaining her position after each cue; she stays still even when I drop her lead and take a few steps back. It's important for her to learn this, so that her future owner is able to let go of her lead or harness and know that she won't have moved away.

Let's not forget to mention Hazel's impeccable food manners! She always waits politely for her bowl to be placed on the floor and for the cue 'okay' before eating. She's learned to ignore any human food while I'm eating too. She'll just sit on her mat – what a good girl!

Hazel enjoys exploring the world with new sights and smells. She's so friendly and always happy to meet new people and dogs when out and about.
