We became interested in puppy raising by chance. When picking up a prescription from our local chemist, we saw a gorgeous guide dog puppy in training in the shop and instantly fell in love. After chatting with the puppy raiser, we went home and applied to become puppy raisers ourselves. Within weeks, our Puppy Development Advisor arrived with the biggest bundle of fluff! We couldn't believe this pup was only eight weeks old; it was love at first sight, and eight years later, we've never looked back.

We really enjoy raising puppies and we're also speakers for Guide Dogs. It's great to meet new people, and these volunteer roles give us some amazing opportunities to do that and talk about the brilliant work Guide Dogs does.

Jasper is the eighth puppy we've welcomed into our busy household. We're a family of eight, including a rehomed golden retriever, Parsnip. Parsnip's amazing with puppies, and he's affectionally known as 'Uncle Parsnip' in our house. All the pups learn so much from him; it's incredible how much he teaches them.

Learning the basics

We've been attending puppy classes, and we're teaching Jasper the basic cues, such as 'sit' and 'down', which he picked up quickly. So, waiting until he hears the release cue 'okay' can be hard for him, but with lots of practice, we're sure he'll get the hang of it. He's mastered sitting and waiting for the whistle before eating, which is fantastic progress. So, we're confident he'll learn to wait in other situations too.

We wouldn't be able to train our life-changing dogs without the help of our volunteer puppy raisers and fosterers. Once our puppies are 8 weeks old, they will go to live with a puppy raiser. These wonderful volunteers provide a loving home and the vital foundation needed for the pup's future role. They introduce early training, socialisation, and a variety of new environments. After 12-16 months, our dogs move on to training school, where they learn guiding skills. Evenings and weekends are usually spent with our fantastic fosterers who care for the dog, reinforce training, and drop them off to training school each day!
