It's as if they have their own daily meetings too!

When I am not working, I take Kevin everywhere with me. He really enjoys going food shopping, going to the post office and to the café. He also enjoys a very long free run and to get as muddy or messy as possible. Thankfully these warmer months mean Kevin can't roll in as many puddles!

Kevin loves to play with his toys. One of his newest quirks is to bring me a soft toy and place it on my lap. If I don't play with him immediately, he trots off and finds another.

Bless him - he thinks I don't want to play with the first toy he has given me! Kevin has a sensitive stomach so I have had to be inventive with his favourite treats, as he can't have the usual dog treats.
