Kevin's arrived at training school



Hello, it's

I've been a Guide Dog Trainer for six years and I love my job! I don't like sitting still, so working with the dogs is great as I'm always on the move. It's very rewarding to see the progress that the dogs make from when they first come in to when they qualify as a guide dog or buddy dog and knowing that I've been a part of that journey is wonderful.

Welcoming Kevin

Kevin has arrived at training school and I have started working with him on a daily basis. Many dogs can find the move to training school quite challenging, unsurprisingly – it is a big change, but Kevin adapted amazingly well! His Puppy Raiser, Kay, sent him with a bag full of his toys to help him feel comfortable. He's also got his favourite blanket, which he's had since he was a young puppy, at his fosterers' home where he stays during the evenings and weekends. Having this helped him to feel at home right away.

Kevin spent a couple of days settling into his new home with his fosterers before coming into training school just for a few hours. On his first day he was re-united with Denny, a black Labrador cross and a fellow guide dog in training who he'd met whilst living with Kay. They were very happy to see each other! Denny is one of the other dogs that I'm training so he and Kevin will be spending lots of time together.

Daily routine

Kevin is dropped off at training school by his fosterers in the morning and usually enjoys a frozen bone to help him settle in. Then we work on some skills such as platform training, which involves walking between two low platforms and stopping with all four paws on one platform. Platform training helps to teach the dogs to walk in a straight line whilst providing tension in the lead or harness. Kevin absolutely loves the platforms; if he is working off lead, he will run and dive on them – he can be a little over-excited at times!

After a short training session, Kevin settles with an interactive toy and has a rest. In the afternoon, we usually go out for a training walk in the local area and practise some other skills such as avoiding distractions and stopping at kerbs. Kevin can be quite strong on the lead, and I currently walk him in a TTouch harness, which allows for multiple points of contact with the lead. This helps to relieve pressure from Kevin's neck and encourages him to move in a balanced way.

In between training sessions, we always ensure there is time for some play and free running. Kevin loves a game of tug and enjoys free running with his furry friends!
