She's recently learnt the word 'give', so when we play fetch, she will happily retrieve and wait for me to throw her toy again!

Lily is very sensible. If it's warm outside, she will lie in the shade without being asked, and sometimes goes inside to cool down on the kitchen floor. She settles very easily and is very affectionate. She still likes to sleep next to Ursi, but it's getting a little tight on the doughnut bed now!

Developing skills

Recently I have taken Lily into shops where she has practised her left and right turns. There is a row of posts just outside the retail park, so Lily practised walking in and out of these, just as we did at puppy class. Lily is also not fazed when using the lift; she will sit in the corner, away from everybody – she's just brilliant! If I stop to speak to someone on our walks or we visit a coffee shop, she has learnt to lie down without me prompting her. She's so well-behaved, you can't help but love her.

Lily picks up things so quickly, she amazes me sometimes. At first, Lily wasn't too keen about electric scooters, so previously, I would sit her at the end of the path, and we'd watch one go past together. We've practised this a few times, and now she's not bothered about them anymore.

Looking ahead

Lily walks very well on the lead, but her dog distraction is something I'm working on. When there is a dog nearby, Lily will get excited if they are too. But if I say 'no, leave' she listens, and we continue with our walk.

Training – puppy to qualified guide dog

It takes around 20 months of training to transform a pup into a qualified guide dog. The pups learn basic skills and are introduced to new surroundings with their Puppy Raiser. They then venture on to Guide Dogs Training School, where they learn the foundation tasks required of a guide dog. The final stages of training focus on their partnership with a new owner, where they learn specific skills tailored to their owner's specific needs.

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
