Over the last eight years I've been a Guide Dog Trainer, and I think I must have trained somewhere in the region of 60 dogs so far! The thing I enjoy the most is developing a bond with each individual dog, and teaching them to perform a role with confidence that wouldn't normally come naturally to them.

Due to delays caused by COVID-19, Monty started training school a bit later than he usually would. This meant that Monty got to stay with Puppy Walkers Joanna and Antony during the summer months! Monty is a very charismatic pup and he definitely took fellow pup Barrett under his wing during his time with Joanna and Antony.

During lockdown Monty and Barrett had a lot of fun practising basic training at home in the garden. During a particularly warm day, Monty joined Joanna and Antony for a picnic and practised his food manners. Monty was brilliantly behaved and had a great time. He even joined Antony for a sunbathe!

When lockdown began to ease Monty was able to visit lots of new places. He even went for a day out at a National Trust property in Devon. This gave him the opportunity to practise his lead work and dog distraction ability. Monty has come so far during this time and has mastered his skills when visiting public places. Not only is Monty perfectly behaved when visiting cafés or shops, but he is also completely comfortable with loud noises such as traffic or building construction. This confidence will help Monty when adapting to new situations.

Introduction to training school

To test how well Monty deals with distractions, I will train his basic obedience both on and off site. This will also help Monty adapt to new locations. Over the next few months Monty will also be introduced to obstacle courses; this will help Monty guide his future owner safely around obstacles in the street. I'm sure Monty will pick up all of these new skills with ease.
