To prepare Murphy for training school we have been working with some local puppy raisers. They have been taking Murphy out for walks to help him learn to follow cues from other people. This will be helpful when he goes to training school as he may need to learn skills from more than one trainer. He has been brilliant, as we knew he would be!

Murphy has grown out of his teenage phase and is doing really well. To build his confidence we have been visiting different towns and cities by public transport to help him get used to the noises and busy environments. He takes everything in his stride, and nothing fazes him!

We attended a local dog show which was a great experience for Murphy with lots of distractions to overcome. He was a little excited when we arrived but soon settled and calmly took in his surroundings. He walks brilliantly on the loose lead – it's been so rewarding seeing him develop.
