Rosie is a fun-loving pup

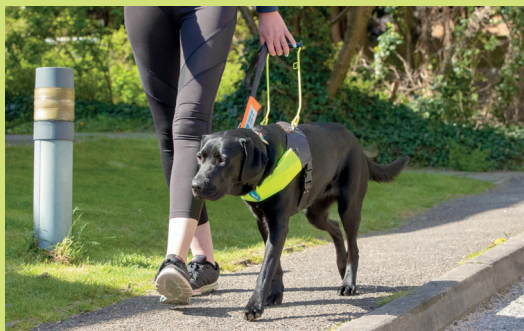

During her time with Edith, Rosie learnt a lot of vital skills that are helpful for her on her journey towards becoming a fully-fledged guide dog. Edith took Rosie to the railway station to help her get familiar with the sights and sounds. They sat and watched lots of trains stop to pick up passengers and then set off again. Rosie seemed a bit disappointed that they were not going to get on any of the trains, which shows that she should be great when reintroduced to using public transport. Rosie was not bothered by the noise of the trains at all, which is a great sign of confidence.
