Sprout's new career



Hello, it's Natalie here and I am a Canine Assisted Partnerships Specialist at Guide Dogs. In your last Pupdate, Sprout's trainer Natalie mentioned all of the skills that she and his other trainer Sue were working on to help Sprout on his journey to become a guide dog. They were focusing on improving his consistency, as he was sometimes a little bit overconfident and would constantly stop on his training walks. Although his trainers were working really hard, they found that Sprout had low motivation to actually do the tasks he would need to do with a guide dog owner. He would rely on his trainer a bit too much and he would get distracted by the things around him.

Unfortunately, we haven't seen any improvements in these behaviours. Every dog is unique, and we soon realised that Sprout would be better suited for an alternative career as a buddy dog.

Buddy dogs

A career as a guide dog might not be quite right for every dog, and some will undergo a career change to become a buddy dog for a child living with sight loss. Buddy dogs can significantly improve a child's wellbeing, like helping with exercise and building confidence, which in turn helps them to become more independent and create better relationships with others. Although a buddy dog isn't a mobility aid in the same way that a guide dog is, they have an incredible impact on the lives of the children they are matched with.

Sprout's previous skills and experiences

During his training, Sprout was great at a lot of crucial skills that will help him as a buddy dog. He tended to struggle with guiding-specific tasks, but his personality and temperament make him perfect for his new career! He's very confident in new environments so he'd be able to go anywhere with his new family. He can travel on any type of transport too; some dogs might struggle with loud buses, but Sprout settles really well.

He's also so affectionate. He loves to be cuddled or get any kind of affection, so he would love a family who would give him a bit of fuss. He's very playful so he could definitely keep up with children that have lots of energy! He can play for hours, but he still settles down well for a snooze once he's tired himself out. He's a real cheeky chap and is lots of fun.
