

In your last Pupdate, Theo's trainer, Emily, mentioned that he was struggling with body sensitivity and wasn't comfortable wearing the guiding harness. Emily worked hard to support him, but he was still showing signs of stress around the harness and was distracted by other dogs, so we decided to assess Theo for an alternative career as a buddy dog. A buddy dog is a companion for a child or young person with a visual impairment and helps them to build confidence and independence. Theo was a perfect candidate as he's great in the home and with people of all ages. It was an immediate yes!

The main aim of my role is to match buddy dogs with their future families, and I do this by assessing each dog and the family's specific needs. Seeing a family meet their dog for the first time is the best part of my job. You watch their faces light up, and you know that no matter what that dog's quirks are, the family is going to love them and have their lives changed.

Finding Theo's forever family

When a family applies for a buddy dog, they go through quite a lengthy training period in which we assess what type of dog would suit them best and teach them all about dog behaviour and care. We want to make sure that families are prepared to have a dog join them, so that we can ensure the partnership is a success. While primarily intended for children with visual impairments, buddy dogs are cared for by their adult caregivers, who are responsible for their wellbeing. Both adults and children in the household benefit from the dog's companionship! Because of this, we work with the whole family when looking at partnerships.



It didn't take me long to find the perfect family for Theo! He's been partnered with Jack's daughter, Anna, who's 13 years old. Anna has a rare heart condition called Alström syndrome, which causes progressive vision and hearing loss. But Anna doesn't let this stop her! She's a determined and enthusiastic young person and competes in judo competitions around the world. She was actually away with her mum, visiting family in Hong Kong, when we visited to take some photos for Theo's Pupdate! Instead, we spent the day with Jack, Anna's dad.

Anna has wanted a dog for a really long time! She's recently moved schools and having a constant friend at home is one of the main reasons that the family applied for a buddy dog. Theo is perfect in this role; he's such a loving boy and is always up for a cuddle! Alongside Braille, Anna is learning sign language, so we might start introducing some of this to Theo too – dogs actually find it much easier to understand signed cues than verbal ones, and it would be nice for her to be able to communicate with Theo in this way.

The partnership is still very new, but Anna's family is extremely
