Hello, it's Kirstie here, Toby's Puppy Raiser.

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#### A little break

Since your last update, Toby has been facing some challenges. I noticed his appetite wasn't quite the same, and his skin was showing signs of irritation. Working with his Puppy Development Advisor (PDA) and his vet, we decided the best course of action was for Toby to rest while undergoing some medical checks; he took a break from puppy classes for a while. The results of the vet checks found he has a skin condition. called atopic dermatitis: this means his skin can be a bit itchy and some of his fur is a little thinner. However, this health issue is manageable and won't prevent him from living a happy life, meeting other dogs and becoming a life changer. With the medication and after changing his kibble, he's showing signs of improvement.

I'm impressed by how enthusiastic Toby always is, no matter the situation. He never misses the chance to greet me with a loving face every morning, dragging his yellow soft toy dog around! During this training break, I maintained a calm and consistent routine for Toby.

We went out and about for walks in quiet areas, visited shops, and enjoyed relaxing in cafés with my family. The food shop is still his favourite! He's fantastic, settling perfectly everywhere I go. He still enjoys travelling by car, observing the route with curiosity while securely fastened.

#### Getting back on track

Toby's PDA has been working closely with his Dog Health and Wellbeing Specialist, Clare. They've assessed him to ensure he's healthy and ready to return to puppy classes. I'm working with them to prepare Toby for his return to his usual routine, where he'll continue learning and exploring new surroundings with me. I will slowly reintroduce some of the cues Toby had previously learnt and monitor how he copes. It's important to follow Toby's lead to ensure he's comfortable.

To encourage him to keep a nice pace while on walks, I introduced him to a gentle leader, and he's making progress. This kind of harness is used alongside his lead and collar, and helps him walk calmly and sensibly without pulling.

But did you know that we also breed and train German shepherds, poodle crosses and curly coated retriever crosses? These dogs often become successful guides and also provide secondary benefits, such as longer strides for faster walkers, or shedding less hair which is very important for guide dog owners with allergies to dog hair!



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
