Toby's been progressing well over the last few months. He's a ball of energy, as usual, loving life and greeting me every morning with so much happiness, while holding his Labrador soft toy. Toby's always up for games and adventures. He adores playing in the garden, and any toy I can throw for him sends him on an exciting chase.

Toby's health

After the care he received some months ago and the change of diet, his atopic dermatitis has improved; it's not as severe as before, and I barely see any signs of irritation these days. However, he sometimes still stops to scratch himself during walks. I'll keep monitoring him to ensure we keep it under control.

Puppy classes

Toby and I returned to the usual puppy raising routine after his break. He's attending puppy classes again and is thrilled to see his fellow pups in training. As he spent some time without seeing them, he finds settling and containing his enthusiasm a little challenging, so I'm working on his focus. I often meet other volunteer puppy raisers for coffee with their pups, so this will help him get accustomed to their presence again. He's great at practising all the basic cues and he's enjoying being back out with his pup friends.

Hello, it's Kirstie here, Toby's Puppy Raiser.

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Toby's mastered the 'chin rest' very well; he rests his chin on a towel on my lap or an empty seat. This is very helpful for everyday checks on his eyes and ears, or at the vet's. It will also be used as a foundation for other skills he'll learn at training school, such as finding a seat.

Out and about

I'm still working on Toby's dog distraction during training. His recall when he free runs in the presence of other dogs has improved, but we've still a long way to go for it to be perfect. Toby's great in shops and indoors too, however, he still gets distracted during training walks. To manage his dog distraction, I tried a new method: I've been keeping a reasonable distance from any approaching pups while walking, ensuring that we're on the opposite side of the road. It's working! Toby doesn't engage too much with them when he sees another dog, but he might turn his head and lose focus on our walk for a bit. This technique helps us keep moving forward, and we can gradually reduce the distance between us and the other dogs.
