# **Growing in confidence**

Since coming to training school, Willow has been showing some inconsistencies in her guiding work where at times she isn't sure of herself. We were hoping this would improve over time as her confidence grew. It's still an area for her to work on, so we've decided to spend a little more time with her before moving her on to advanced training.

# Staying focused

I have been working on Willow's dog distraction. She used to stop and stare at other dogs, but I'm delighted to say that she's now doing much better! She now walks past dogs right next to her without stopping or even looking away from the task at hand. What's more, now that her dog distraction has improved, her recall has too! She loves to retrieve toys and I'm able to keep her engaged so she's more consistent.

Willow does get a little bit distracted by all the different things to smell when training. Although she is improving, it's something that I'm paying a lot of attention to as when she starts to sniff, it can affect how she walks on the lead. Food and clicker training works – she's a very intelligent dog and knows that the clicker means she has shown the right behaviour. I'm pleased with how she's progressing with it so far.

### Out and about

Since your last Pupdate, Willow and I have been on trains and buses together! I was so pleased with her on the train because she settled so calmly. We need to practise the buses a little bit more as the noise can make Willow a little bit restless, but she's been doing really well.

I'll be working closely with Willow to improve her confidence, and I'd like to take her on a trip into London to try out the Tube.









### Willow's future

I think that Willow would work well with a guide dog owner who benefits more from short, regular routes than long ones. I could definitely imagine her with someone a little bit older with a busy social life who sees lots of people and pops to shops at a leisurely pace. Willow is a very funny little character – I find that she's actually more like a cat than a dog! She loves attention and affection on her own terms and the bonds she forms with people are really special. I think she would make a wonderful companion for someone one day.
