Puppy Raising Operations Manager

As we approach summertime, I wanted to send a warm and sunny thank you to all our incredible puppy raisers in the Northwest! Whether you are just beginning your puppy raising journey or are a seasoned volunteer, I wanted you to know that you are very much appreciated for all the hard work and dedication that you give to your pups and to Guide Dogs.

In this month's edition, we will be focusing on positional cues.

Positional cues can be a fun, interactive and engaging activity which can help with our puppies training, as well as help tighten the bond between handler and pup. The main ones we use at Guide Dogs are "sit", "down" and "stand". These can be trained in a way that is not only useful within a household but can then be taken out to external areas to help assist your pup with their training.

As with many of our training sessions we advise to keep positional cue training short and always end on a high note! Focus on the quality, over quantity of sessions, and be led by your own individual puppy's enjoyment and understanding of the exercises.

The good thing about practising positional cues is that they can be done in all weathers. So, if it's too hot or too cold, use positional cue training to keep your puppy entertained in a calm and productive manner. The other positive with this training, is that the difficulty level can always be increased; both the duration of the cues, and the distance between you and the pup, with distraction elements thrown in to test your puppy's understanding.



Once a good solid understanding has been undertaken at home, this can be generalised by asking the puppy the same cues on the lead, and then in different external environments.

There are many examples with puppies on schemes, where a good understanding of a positional cue then aids another area of training. For instance, if a pup is struggling with dog distraction, positional cues can benefit a pup's learning if we ask them for a behaviour they already know, such as a sit. Think of it as a helping hand for your pup. So, when a dog is approaching, and if they're unsure what to do, ask them for something you know they understand. Remember, sits, downs and stands will continue to be used when a pup enters a training school and will remain consistent throughout their training.

We will continue to practise these positional cues in virtual and in-person puppy classes, as well as in regular visits from your Puppy Development Advisor. As ever, there is online documents on our e-learning platform, Kallidus, to help your learning and understanding of these.


