

North West region: puppy raising update December 2025

Hi All, Vanessa Scott here, and I am the Puppy Raising Operations Manager for the Northwest region.

As the year draws to a close, I want to take a moment to celebrate the incredible dedication and love you've shown to our puppies throughout 2025. Your commitment has helped shape confident puppies who are on their way to making a life-changing difference.

This month, we'll share festive tips for arriving visitors and keeping your pups safe during the festive season. Some highlights and inspiring stories, and provide you updates on upcoming coffee dates for the diary.

Puppy Raising Operations Manager's message

The main theme for this month's newsletter is setting yourself and visitors up for success. In the video, we look at avoiding some of the common issues puppy raisers encounter, how visitors to their home should behave around a guide dog puppy, and the desired behaviours a guide dog puppy should demonstrate when friends and family visit.

Christmas can be an exciting (and sometimes overwhelming) time for your puppies because of the extra visitors, noise, and changes in routine. For now, here are some practical tips to help settle your puppy around visitors:

Prior planning

Before your guests arrive prepare your home for visitors, plan and anticipate the doorbell ringing. What will you do to teach your puppy how to behave when they arrive? Always remember safety first, as your puppy will want to rush to the door to greet your visitors and say hello. Remember the two-door rule, there should always be 2 doors to the entrance / exit, such as closing another door whilst you answer the front door, or a baby gate so that it prevents your puppy from escaping onto the drive or the street. If you



have planned guests, you could always give them prior instructions on what to do when they enter / leave to keep the puppy safe and prevent any undesirable behaviours from your puppy.

Stick to routine

Keep feeding, toileting, and exercise times as consistent as possible. Predictability helps the puppy to remain as calm and as relaxed possible during periods of change. Remember there may be fireworks during the New Year celebrations so your puppy may be reluctant to go outside, refer to Kallidus for "fireworks and unexpected noises" see this recording for more information on how to manage your puppy around these noises.

Prepare a safe space

Prepare a safe place, a calm area away from the hustle and bustle, such as a crate, pen, or behind a baby gate. Make it cozy with their bed, toys, and maybe an interactive toy or a chew to keep them occupied. This gives them a retreat if things get too busy or if puppy gets too excited and needs a break.

Controlled greetings

As visitors enter the home ask them to ignore the puppy initially, no eye contact, talking, or touching until the puppy is calm. Reward calm behaviour with gentle praise. If your puppy gets overexcited, you can always pop them on a lead or give them a chew, bone or interactive toy to occupy them whilst your visitors settle in.

Introduce visitors gradually if possible. Keep interactions short and positive, then give the puppy settle time.

If your puppy is in on a lead, in a crate /pen or behind a baby gate when visitors arrive, wait until puppy is calm before releasing them to say hello.



As always, each puppy goes at their own speed and needs to be treated as an individual. There are many ways to teach your puppy the settle around visitors, and this will be done stage by stage, setting them up for success at every step.

It is also a good habit to think has the puppies mental and physical needs been met so far that day, to ensure success in the settle? To reiterate, every puppy is different and will need different levels of enrichment and training to ensure they are in the correct mental state to get the settle correct. If this is combined with the correct behaviours from the visitors, you stand a much higher chance of a successful greet and settle.

The use of food in these types of settings is dependent on your own puppy, some puppies can settle without food, or some may require food-based rewards. So please discuss this with your PDA.

Good luck with your visitor greetings and settle training and thank you for all your amazing efforts!
