Puppy Raising Operations Manager message

Spring is in the air! As the days get lighter and warmer it's the perfect time to get outside and enjoy the fresh spring air with your pups. The change in seasons brings new opportunities for training and socialisation, as well as more chances for your puppy to explore the world around them. In this month's newsletter we are focusing on going back to basics with dog obedience such as positional cues and manners - the foundation for all puppy raising training.

Back to Basics

Puppy obedience may seem like a smaller aspect of the training pathway, but it provides opportunities for quick, achievable, fun and interactive training sessions to be established with your puppy, that lays the foundations for further training and behaviours. Obedience is one of the few behaviours that can be started almost right away when a puppy is placed with a puppy raiser. It can be tailored, in both duration and difficulty, to the puppy's individual learning needs, and progressed at a pace that suits both puppy and volunteer.

There is no limit to how difficult you make it, which can be very beneficial at the later pathways of the puppy raising journey, when the puppy is ready to intake into training. Can the puppy be told to "sit", "stand" and "down" for 30 seconds? Amazing! If yes, we can then see if they can do a minute. Can they remain in a position, whilst their handler moves away two metres? Brilliant! Can then do it when the handler moves three metres away etc? This can provide an excellent session when the weather outside may be too hazardous to walk in, but the pup still needs mental enrichment.



The fast paced, quickly progressed and highly reinforced sessions then help create an even stronger bond with the puppy's handler, as well as setting the foundations for behaviour that can be taken outside the house and into the wider world.

Recently, we had a puppy that struggled with self-control in social situations. This particularly manifested in being very distracted by people/dogs and rubbish, and the pup would lunge towards these. The handler struggled to get the puppies attention in these situations, due to the level of distraction.

By going back to basics and building up obedience in the house, such as sit/down/stand and door manners, it helped the puppy's resilience and self-control, which could then be built up to help its self-control in busier and more demanding environments. It also helped build an understanding of when the puppy was being compliant, and they were rewarded heavily and positively, which then helped the pup know how to behave around more difficult distractions on the lead.

If we see the training and behaviours we expect of our puppies as building blocks, core obedience acts a solid and secure foundation for the rest to be built upon.

North West puppies in the news

Puppy raiser Lisa Allison and Puppy Development Supervisor, Jay Murray, on BBC Breakfast.



On 3 January, we were live on the sofa with puppy Herby promoting our need for puppy raisers across the UK. We saw a huge spike in applications and our Volunteering Office are currently interviewing new applicants!

These results compare to one day's worth of activity on our website on Thursday 2 January (before BBC Breakfast was aired) and on Friday 3 January:

- The general volunteering page saw a 768% increase in users, from 893 to 7,747.
- The dog hub area of our website (which is canine related volunteering info) saw an 884% increase in users, from 744 to 7,300.
- And the puppy raising role description page saw a 1,557% increase in users, from 345 to 5,700.



 On Thursday 2 January, we had 24 applications for puppy raising. The three days after the show was aired, we had over 550 applications.

So, a huge increase in the use of the website, attraction and applications for puppy raising.

'Settle days' at Atherton

January saw the launch of the Atherton 'settle days' for pups coming up to intake age. These days allow both the pup and puppy raiser to experience Atherton before the day comes when the pup leaves for training. The day's primary focus is to create a positive environment and experience for the puppy, so that when they enter training that have had a previous positive history of the environment.

The days are primarily for pups coming up to intake age, but any age puppy can be considered for a visit. The days consist of a free run, a settle in a kennel environment, a sniffy walk around the site and a gentle introduction to the training van. The feedback has been extremely positive and has allowed puppy raisers to take in Atherton in a calm and positive setting, away from the high emotions of the day when the pup enters training for real.

These days are currently running monthly, and if you would be interested in joining one please speak to your Puppy Development Advisor. If you can't make the dates currently planned, we can be flexible and would happily offer alternate dates where you can come in for a 1-2-1 settle session with your puppy.
