

Scotland & Northern Ireland region: puppy raising update February 2025

Hi all, Vanessa Scott and Janet Champion here, and we are the Puppy Raising Operations Managers for Scotland and Northern Ireland.

Puppy Raising Operations Managers message

Spring is in the air! As the days get lighter and warmer it's the perfect time to get outside and enjoy the fresh spring air with your pups. The change in seasons brings new opportunities for training and socialisation, as well as more chances for your puppy to explore the world around them. This month's edition we are focusing on "back to basics" dog obedience (positional cues) and manners - the foundation for all puppy raising training.

Back to Basics

Puppy obedience may seem like a smaller aspect of the training pathway, but it provides opportunities for quick, achievable, fun and interactive training sessions to be established with your puppy, that lays the foundations for further training and behaviours. Obedience is one of the few behaviours that can be started almost right away when a puppy is placed with a puppy raiser. It can be tailored, in both duration and difficulty, to the puppy's individual learning needs, and progressed at a pace that suits both puppy and volunteer.

There is no limit to how difficult you make it, which can be very beneficial at the later pathways of the puppy raising journey, when the puppy is ready to intake into training. Can the puppy be told to "sit", "stand" and "down" for 30 seconds? Amazing! If yes, we can then see if they can do a minute. Can they remain in a position, whilst their handler moves away two metres? Brilliant! Can then then do it when the handler moves three metres away etc? This can provide an excellent session when the weather outside may be too hazardous to walk in, but the pup still needs mental enrichment.

The fast paced, quickly progressed and highly reinforced sessions then help create an even stronger bond with the puppy's handler, as well as setting



the foundations for behaviour that can be taken outside the house and into the wider world.

Recently, we had a puppy that struggled with self-control in social situations. This particularly manifested in being very distracted by people/dogs and rubbish, and the pup would lunge towards these. The handler struggled to get the puppies attention in these situations, due to the level of distraction.

By going back to basics and building up obedience in the house, such as sit/down/stand and door manners, it helped the puppy's resilience and self-control, which could then be built up to help its self-control in busier and more demanding environments. It also helped build an understanding of when the puppy was being compliant, and they were rewarded heavily and positively, which then helped the pup know how to behave around more difficult distractions on the lead.

If we see the training and behaviours we expect of our puppies as building blocks, core obedience acts a solid and secure foundation for the rest to be built upon.
