# Puppy Raising Operations Manger's message

# Settling in social situations



Helping your dog settle in social situations is one of the most valuable skills you can teach and one of the most common challenges I find I'm talking to the puppy raising team about! Whether it's a busy café, a puppy class, or a family gathering, being able to relax and remain calm makes life easier and more enjoyable for both dog and handler, but it can be hard to achieve. Setting your dog up for success means creating the right environment, preparing ahead, and giving them the tools they need to cope confidently.

As you may already have found settling doesn't usually come naturally, especially for puppies, who we know are curious, excitable, and eager to explore the world around them!



Thinking ahead makes all the difference. Simple strategies like choosing quieter spots at first, building up time gradually, taking the time to complete mental or physical exercises before starting a settle session, and even thinking about when the puppy was last fed can help set the stage for successful and restful settles.

Something I am conscious of with my own rescue dog is that there is a difference between rest and waiting for the next thing to happen; we are aiming for a dog that is confident to rest and relax in social settings which will be the best preparation for them as a guide dog.



Puppy Development Advisor, Georgina Eade, is an expert at teaching puppies to settle. She feels that "teaching a dog to settle isn't just about keeping them quiet, it's about giving them the confidence to relax in any situation. When a dog learns to switch off, the whole world opens up to them in a calmer, more positive way."

When things aren't going smoothly, it's always better to ask for help sooner rather than later.

Please speak to you Puppy Development Advisor if you're having any challenges with settling, they'll

be able to provide you with practical tips and a clear plan to support both you and your puppy.
