Hillside Golf Club meet their Name A Puppy, Mulligan



Hillside Golf Club had a very special visit from puppy Mulligan, a yellow Labrador x Golden Retriever, named by the club after they raised £10,000 for Guide Dogs.

The 2024 club's captains, Phil Unsworth and Ruth Carson, chose Guide Dogs as one of their Charities of the Year and were pleased to donate the huge sum of money to name a puppy.

Naming a puppy is an opportunity for the public to give a guide dog something totally unique: its name. The club will now be at the heart of Mulligan's story and will follow his journey towards becoming a

future life-changer. Both captains chose to support Guide Dogs after chatting to a friend who is currently raising a guide dog puppy.

Phil said: "Guide Dogs was chosen as both Ruth and I wanted to leave a legacy of kindness, friendship and support from our year as captains, and Guide Dogs fulfils those values. We both have experience with people with full or partial sight loss, so we absolutely know the difference Mulligan will make to people's lives. We wanted a golf-themed name for the puppy, and Mulligan is a term for '2nd chance to perform an action' - in relation to golf this allows a player (informally) to replay a shot. We think the whole concept of the name kind of represents what Guide Dogs provide; a 'second chance' at living a normal life that has been affected through sight loss."

As they have raised £10,000, this equates to supporting a puppy right through to training. As a thank you, the golf club got to meet Mulligan, who paid a visit to the club and its members along with puppy raisers Gillian and Paul Bartlett.



Tracey Digby, Community Fundraising Relationships Manager at Guide Dogs, said: "We're incredibly grateful to Phil, Ruth and the members at Hillside Golf Club for choosing to support Guide Dogs, and for donating such a tremendous amount."



Another bus company helps us out





D&G Bus, a bus company operating in in Cheshire, Derbyshire, Greater Manchester and Staffordshire, came to a Guide Dogs puppy class in Crewe so puppies could learn how to ride a bus, without the stress and pressures of real life.

Coming across a bus for the first time can be quite scary for a puppy. Lisa Cooper, a Puppy Development Advisor for Guide Dogs, said: "When our puppy raisers are out with their puppies and at bus stations or bus stops, the engine is running, it is loud, people are waiting to go; it's not the ideal training scenario for young pups.

"Dan at D&G very kindly offered to bring a bus down to our puppy class in Crewe to practice positive associations with all the noises of the bus, getting on and off, settling at a seat, and travelling. We could then take our time, approach the bus at the puppy's pace and make it a positive experience for everyone".

Dan Flanagan, the Operations Manager at D&G, said: "We're happy and privileged to support Guide Dogs' puppies in training. It's really fascinating to see what needs to be taken into consideration. We're looking forward to seeing more puppies and their raisers at the next training session."

Hot weather tips

As the weather (hopefully) starts to warm up, it's important that we keep our dogs safe.



While we can wear light clothing, they are carrying around a fur coat and therefore at a higher risk of heat stroke, which is extremely risky for our dogs. Exercising, even moderate walking, is often a cause of this as dogs cannot sweat (except through their paws) and rely on panting to get rid of heat.

Please use the five-second test on the ground with your hand (especially tarmac), and if it's too hot for you, then it's too hot for paws.
