

Scotland and Northern Ireland region: puppy raising update June 2024

Hi, it's Gillian here. Welcome everyone to Scotland and Northern Ireland's June puppy raising update, the days are certainly getting warmer so perfect timing for a reminder to keep yourself and pups safe during the warm weather.

When pups are at different developmental and health stages, they are less able to regulate their body temperature.

Signs to lookout for:

- Excessive loud panting
- Extreme Thirst
- Pale Tongue and gums
- Thick Saliva
- Increased heart rate
- Skin around muzzle /neck slow to retract when pinched.



During extremely hot weather, avoid walking or exercising pups during the middle part of the day, aim for early mornings or evenings. Try walking in the shade allowing pups to walk at a slower pace and keep journeys short. Always have water on hand to keep pups hydrated and keep them out of ponds and drinking any sea water. Avoid wearing their puppy coat to allow for more air flow.

Create a cool spot in the house or garden out of the sun maybe on a tiled floor or on wet towels but as we all know pups will find their own spot for comfort don't be too disappointed if they end up lying elsewhere.



Never leave your pup in the car even with the windows open there is significant danger of the pup overheating.

Some tips for keeping yourself save when out walking in the sun.

Stay hydrated, keep skin covered wear long sleeves, where possible walk in the shade and take breaks out of the sun, wear sunscreen, hats, and don't forget your sunglasses.
