these amazing life-changers.



# The year so far

This year so far, you've welcomed 110 new puppies into your homes and have raised and fostered 77 pups who have transitioned into training either with our regional teams or further afield to training centres in the North West or South East.



Those pups will be working with their Guide Dog Trainers or Guide Dog Mobility Specialists through the Standardised Training for Excellent Partnerships (STEP) programme, although a good number having already qualified as guide dogs.

If your pup has had a career change to buddy or rehoming - thank you for supporting them on their journey. With your work and insight of your pup's behaviours, it helps us to make the right decision at the right time, and remember they're all stars, just in different ways.

You will be aware we released updated puppy raising material on our eLearning platform, Kallidus, on 9 April. If you do not have access, please ask your PDA. It's available for all fosterers and puppy raisers either online or in PDF format, if required.
