

North East region: puppy raising update August 2025

Hi All, Janet Champion here, and I am the Puppy Raising Operations Manager for the North East region.

Puppy Raising Operations Manager's message

You will have seen in the puppy raising newsletter that there is a video on how to negotiate doorways with your puppy in a safe and calm manner. The video demonstrates various techniques that can be used to support safe and calm passage through different types of doorways.

It also shows how to prevent some common issues from developing such as lunging or rushing through doorways. Some of the reasons for this behaviour could be your puppy's desire to investigate what is on the other side of the door or they want to get through as quickly as possible because, perhaps at some point, they experienced something which has made them worry when passing through an open doorway; perhaps the gap didn't feel wide enough for them or a door started to close before they were fully through.

It's also common to see, when hinges are on the left-hand side that handlers reach across the dog even with bags etc hanging over their arms to hold the door open. When this happens, a dog is only given a narrow gap and may feel that their head will be hit by hanging objects. In this situation, it's far more likely a dog will either back off and refuse to pass through the door or will rush to get to the other side.

It's also worth thinking about the scenario when you don't know what is on the other side of a door as this is what our guide dog owners experience every day: perhaps a distraction such as another dog, a cat or even a child in a pushchair with a sausage roll, or something more hazardous in a busier area such as an obstacle or moving object. By negotiating doors calmly and consistently there is much more chance of managing the unexpected events which may occur.

While it's great to introduce patience from an early age, it's never too late to start consistently introducing door manners. I remember how a simple change brought about a huge change in the behaviour of adolescent male Labrador called Merlin.

Merlin's behaviour had become more challenging for his puppy raiser as his hormones kicked in. She had stopped enjoying taking him out and about so contacted her Puppy Development Advisor for help. As soon as she clipped the lead on to leave the house, the Puppy Development Advisor noticed that he wasn't being polite when negotiating the exterior doors of the home, so, instead of going out for the walk they had planned, they did a focused session on door manners at the front door.

Merlin loved this session and focused well on the task in hand and the subsequent rewards he received for making progress. The Puppy Development Advisor booked in a follow up visit for a week's time and was amazed at the difference in Merlin's behaviour when going out of the house.

At Merlin's next puppy class, the Puppy Development Advisor allocated extra time to work with him before class to bring those same techniques into a new environment. By introducing patience at an exciting time, the puppy raiser was able to adapt the techniques whenever she felt Merlin was starting to become over excited, to give him chance to calm down and take everything in, and just as importantly to give his puppy raiser a breather too.
