Puppy Raising Operations Manager's message

For the main newsletter this time we have produced a video on the theme of 'how to travel safely through doorways'. Under this theme, the video will look at resolving common issues when it comes to training your puppy to pass through doorways correctly and safely.

You may be saying to yourself, "why does this matter?"

This matters for several reasons including:

- The safety of yourself and your puppy; and
- The safety of future guide dog owners

If you imagine that you and your puppy are approaching a closed door. Both of you won't know what is on the other side. There could be anything: a potential hazard to you (as a handler or guide dog owner) or your dog. This why we work with puppy raisers and puppies to safely manage/negotiate doors and doorways.

A good example is a doorway leading out onto a busy high street. As a handler, we don't know what might immediately greet us when walking through: it could be a cyclist whizzing past; it could be another dog; a child or even a courier delivering parcels.

All of these are potential hazards that could cause harm to a puppy/dog and their handler, if a puppy/dog bolts through a doorway. For a guide dog owner, a slow and steady management of doors and doorways by a guide dog ensures their safety and helps them feel in control of their journey.



In the 'how to travel safely through doors' video, we explore how you can train your puppy to have good manners when it comes to negotiating doors and open doorways.

Your Puppy Development Advisor will be covering these points in your individual visits or at your local puppy class.
