Dogs in training

Vogue, a one-year and nine-month-old female German Shepherd has been focusing on training for an eye exam with her Guide Dog Trainer, David. All our dogs undergo a routine ophthalmic check after entering training to ensure they don't have anything affecting their vision. Vogue found her initial check a bit overwhelming, so the exam wasn't completed.

Amazingly, David's son has printed us a 3D model of the equipment used by the Eye Specialists so we can utilise it in training to prepare our dogs for the exam. Vogue has been working hard with David on this, she is now a lot more comfortable with the equipment and is almost ready for a new eye check in December, go Vogue!

Candy is a four-year-old female yellow Labradoodle and qualified guide dog. Sadly, her guide dog owner recently passed away, so Candy has returned to Forfar for some refresher training with Guide Dog Trainer, Carol, before being partnered up with a new guide dog owner.

Rodney "Trotters" is feline fine



Within puppy raising, our Puppy Development Advisors and volunteer puppy raisers make every effort to ensure that our guide dog puppies grow up to become well-behaved and confident dogs, so they're ready for training with support from their volunteer fosterers.
