Dogs in the breeding programme



Guide dog dad, Ray

Stud dog Ray, a golden retriever, has recently fathered his first litter of guide dog puppies, including son Thor. Thor will be puppy raised by Ray's breeding dog holder, so hopefully Ray can pass on some wisdom to his son!

Ray recently appeared on BBC East Midlands, who named Ray in honour of their late colleague, and they will continue to follow him and Thor as Thor grows up.

Guide dog mum, Sparky

Sparky is a golden retriever who lives in Oxfordshire with volunteer **breeding dog holders, Cliff and Louise**, and their three children - plus their pet dog, cats, tortoises and chickens! Sparky's first litter of puppies will be turning one in January, and we are hoping that she will have a second litter in 2024 - and maybe one of the pups will also join the breeding programme.

Sparky is a much-loved dog, and a wonderful guide dog mum. Louise says: "She is the perfect mum. Su from Guide Dogs kept saying to us 'you think you love her now, but just wait until you see her being a mum.' And she was so right, you just love her even more."



Breeding news and numbers

Litter payment name change

We are changing the name of the expense payments we make to volunteers who look after our puppies and breeding dogs. From now on we'll be referring to 'flat-rate expense reimbursements' rather than 'litter payments' or 'allowances' that we've used in the past. For those volunteers who choose to receive these, there is no change to the amount or the way you claim so you do not need to take any action based on the name change.

Breeding numbers (Jan-Nov 2023)

- 138 litters
- 1,038 puppies born
- 7 puppies is the average litter size
- 1,270 puppies placed with puppy raisers, including 232 outside/part outside-bred puppies
- 243 guide dog mums
- 77 guide dog dads
- 91 new dogs join the breeding programme (67 guide dog mums and 24 guide dog dads)
- 162 matings undertaken so far this year
- 95% conception rate
