I'm Jane Louth, Canine Assisted Services (CAS) Operations Manager for the North East. My role is to manage the Guide Dog Trainers and Guide Dog Mobility Specialists - our technical staff who train our dogs and get them ready for partnerships with service users. This wouldn't be possible without the hard work of our volunteers, which starts from day one with breeding dog holders, through to puppy raisers and fosterers.

I am delighted to tell you that for the first time, the North East region is currently raising 160 puppies, which is a fantastic achievement. Last year, we peaked at around 130 puppies. As you know, everyone at Guide Dogs has been working really hard to breed, train and match more guide dogs, so this is brilliant news - and an achievement that would not be possible without the support of our volunteers. And our Newcastle site is now fully up and running and is making a big difference to the puppies and dogs who come in.

Aside from our dogs, a great deal has been happening within Volunteering, including a lot of activity from our volunteer fundraisers (click on the links on the right-hand side to find out). You should hear from us, including updates from the wider volunteering community, around four times a year. Each edition will give you an insight into flavour of what's happening within your local team, activities from other departments, events, volunteer/service user stories and how staff and volunteers support our dogs, from puppy to partnership. Dogs in training



Merlot

When working, Merlot is very good at passing distractions, particularly dogs. She is currently working on standing in a straight position at the kerb edge. When Merlot finds herself in a café situation, she can take a bit of time to settle as she stares at her handler, hoping for kibble.

Merlot also has a lot of energy when she's not working. She enjoys off-lead exercise and has a brilliant recall. She loves play sessions with her dog wellbeing volunteers when she's not training with her trainer, Maxine.

She is a very bright little girl, who is almost ready to move to the next stage of her training. Maxine will soon wear a blindfold to test that Merlot is ready to move on.

Carol is currently our only Labradoodle cross. She requires a lot of grooming because she is extra fluffy and loves to be cuddled and fussed over. She loves play sessions with her best friend Kenny. Squeaky teddies are her favourite.

Carol is in the early stages of her training where she's learning the basics for around nine weeks. She's settled very well within the office and with the other training dogs, and staff too. In training, she's happy to put her head in the harness on cue, and is stopping at downkerbs and upkerbs on cue. She's also learning to locate objects and enjoys finding a chair on cue too. Overall, Carol is a good all-rounder with lots of potential to do well.

She'll then move to the Partnership Preparation stage where the extra work will be done to ensure the chosen match is successful. Well done, Annie, you're nearly there.

Hi there!

I'm Janet Champion, the Canine Assisted Services (CAS) Operations Manager for puppy development in the North East Region at Guide Dogs. I kicked off my journey with Guide Dogs back in January 1995 as an Apprentice Guide Dog Mobility Instructor, spending 14 fantastic years in that role(now known as a Guide Dog Mobility Specialist). Initially based at the former Middlesbrough Training Centre, I later moved to Leeds.

In the early days, my Guide Dog Mobility Specialist role involved the advanced training of dogs, matching them with people with sight loss, and nurturing their partnerships. Since 2009, I've taken on various management and supervisory roles within the training department. Two years ago, I jumped at the chance to join puppy raising, and I can honestly say it's been a rewarding experience. Working with our motivated and positive team, not to mention our incredible volunteers, brings me immense joy.

And I want to share the joy of puppy raising with volunteers outside of puppy raising. It's really fascinating. In future, staff and our volunteer puppy raising team will show you how we put our Puppy Raising for Excellent Partnerships (PREP) training programme into practice, and the different ways in which we help set up our puppies for success.

Hello! I'm Shannon Butler and I am the Volunteering Coordinator in Newcastle. I started this role in September, so I am still quite new to Guide Dogs but so far, I have loved getting to know the Newcastle team and meeting lots of our wonderful volunteers and dogs at different events.

My role includes thinking of new, creative ways to attract and onboard volunteers, engaging with the public and our current volunteers, and planning/running events such as our volunteer socials.

One of our current priorities for Newcastle is to expand our new puppy raising scheme in North Northumberland and the Scottish borders. Puppy raisers provide our puppies with the vital foundation for their future role as a guide dog by providing one of our puppies a loving home for 12-16 months and guiding our puppies through training, socialisation, and the introduction to new environments and experiences. This is a fantastic role which is both rewarding and vital to our charity. We have been advertising across the region for this role but are specifically in need of puppy raisers across North Northumberland.

We are also busy recruiting for fosterers to look after the dogs after they leave their puppy raisers and start training. In Newcastle, we are looking for training dog fosterers to provide homes for the dogs as they go into early training for around six months.

We are also currently looking to onboard short-term, advanced training dog fosterers in the Teesside area including **Guisborough**, **Redcar**, **Acklam**, **Ingleby Barwick and Stokesley**. This role involves taking care of a dog for around eight weeks whilst they embark on their journey to become a life-changer. This role would involve one of our Guide Dog Trainers collecting and dropping off your training dog each day from your home, so this role would be ideal for anyone who works from home or is retired. You'll get to see the progress the dog is making in their training and be a vital part of their journey, without the commitment of looking after a dog full-time.

Volunteering

Finally for promoting volunteering at Guide Dogs, we have been dedicating lots of our time to recruit new fundraisers and fundraising group coordinators in specific areas, including Morpeth and Wansbeck. We are putting a lot of effort in behind the scenes to think of new and imaginative ways to fill these roles. If you have any ideas, please let us know, in the meantime watch this space.

Partnering with our local fundraising teams, I have attended many events where I have met some wonderful volunteers, guide dog owners and guide dogs. Over the past couple of months, I have visited Accenture, the Metrocentre, Northumberland Street and Tesco Bank alongside our fundraisers to talk to the public about getting involved with Guide Dogs and raising awareness for our charity.
