Hello from the training team at the Scotland Regional Centre. I'm Kate, Canine Assisted Services (CAS) Operations Manager here in Forfar.

We have had a great start to the year in our region; welcoming 25 new dogs to Forfar for training, qualifying five new partnerships already and supporting several more dogs currently on class. In February, we had a visit from our CEO Andrew Lennox, who worked from Forfar for two days, enabling him to meet many staff members in various roles and departments, as well as some of our volunteers on site.

We are running low on collars, leads and T-Touch harnesses so we would ask anyone who has looked after one of our dogs to please check in cupboards, drawers, any hidden corners to see if you have any lying around that you could return to site. This would save having to order new equipment, leading to a financial saving for the charity.

Finally, at the end of March we will be hosting a 'Get Together' event at the Regional Centre for all CAS volunteers that work directly with the Scotland Regional Centre. Media round-up

In the last newsletter, we shared our recent campaign success, with nationwide measures being introduced to tackle pavement parking. On 29 January, Edinburgh became the first city in Scotland to enforce these changes, which we have been celebrating in national media.

Guide dog owner Elaine MacKenzie shared her experience of dealing with dangerously parked vehicles in lengthy segments on BBC Breakfast and BBC Morning Live, with her quotes also being broadcast across countless TV and radio news programmes. Online articles included BBC News, as well as regional and local titles.

In January, <u>Guide Dogs featured on BBC One's Lifeline Appeal</u> with 71-year-old Margaret, from Kirkintilloch, sharing her sight loss journey. Margaret starred in the episode, presented by actor and Guide Dogs ambassador Wendi Peters, and spoke about the life-changing support she has received from our Vision Rehabilitation Service (VRS).

Margaret shared how, after losing her guide dog Bob in tragic circumstances, she felt she had lost her independence. Thanks to the support of Lucy from our VRS team, Margaret told how she has now been learning independent living and long cane skills, which have enabled her to get out and about again. The Appeal has been brilliantly received, with significant donations to Guide Dogs as a result.

Guide dog owner, Margaret Barclay, featured in the Daily Record, having recently been partnered with her beautiful new life-changer Ranger. Ranger is one of our record-breaking litter of 16, born to guide dog mum Unity in early 2022, and was given his name through our <u>Name a Puppy</u> <u>scheme</u>.

Margaret said: "He has absolutely changed my life and given me the confidence to get back out again. I love going out walking and he gives me the freedom to go shopping, use public transport independently and meet friends. Between dogs, I often relied on my husband, so it has been great having that independence again."

Volunteer Betty Kinnear was named in the New Year Honours list, which was reported by The Courier. Betty, from Aberfeldy, is set to be presented with a British Empire Medal (BEM). These are awarded to people who have shown a 'hands-on' service to the local community, such as a charitable or voluntary activity.

Having supported Guide Dogs for three decades, Betty has made a monumental impact on the lives of people living with sight loss, initially through puppy raising, and more recently through her fundraising with the Perth & District Branch. Congratulations Betty!
