The world is such an exciting place to Bolt and he can lose focus easily. I'm working on developing his concentration as other dogs, cats and even plastic bags can distract him! When he is focused he is very bright and picks things up quickly and so I keep our training sessions short and sweet to make the most of these moments.

I'm also teaching Bolt to sit at kerbs by giving him lots of praise when he sits next to one. Bolt is fantastic on buses and trains, and we will soon try the tube for the first time.
