Preparing for Early Training

Soon Joy will be progressing to early training so we have been making sure she has mastered her basic obedience skills.

Her recall is brilliant, even in new, exciting places like Regents Park. When I am out on my own with her she never strays too far away. 'Touch' is another command she excels at due to her loving nature. When you put out your hand for her to touch she does it almost automatically

without the command. This will be brilliant for her future owner as it will allow them to locate Joy easily. She really does love being close to people and will make an amazing guide dog as well as a brilliant companion.

Training – Puppy to qualified guide dog

It takes around 20 months of training to transform a newborn pup into a qualified guide dog.

The pups learn basic commands and are introduced to new surroundings with their Puppy Walker.

They then venture on to early training where they spend about 19 weeks with



a Guide Dog Trainer learning the foundation tasks required of a guide dog. For the last 12 weeks they're with a Guide Dogs Mobility Instructor for partnership training to learn specific skills tailored to their owner's specific needs.
